#### POMERANIAN CHARITABLE TRUST AND EDUCATIONAL SEMINAR

Hopefully the New Year finds you making plans to attend the National in March and that you have noticed a schedule change from previous years. The educational seminar kicks off the start of activities on Sunday afternoon on March 9 at 1 PM. We realize this might necessitate moving up your travel plans. Here is an explanation of why this needed to occur.

APC has the same problems scheduling its National that other clubs experience. It comes down to having so many good activities that we desire to do in so little time. Formulating a National schedule is like working with a jigsaw puzzle. Each activity requires matching the block of time needed with the availability of proper-sized room. Some of those blocks which are the actual competitive blocks are also dictated by AKC rules. These keep in mind the number allowances of judging per day and even when there may be judging breaks.

It becomes easily apparent that the APC three-day schedule cannot accommodate a 3-hour or longer seminar. Until this year we have had presenters that could oblige our 2-hour request. However, most of the nationally recognized speakers have set formats that they will not adjust to less time. The speakers have experience knowing that their subject matter just cannot be adequately presented in less time.

It becomes further apparent that there is no perfect solution to this scheduling dilemma. One of the positives about the Sunday time slot is that attendees will not be sandwiched hurriedly in between other main events and can then look forward to continuing their discussions while socializing at the very popular hospitality evening.

Taking under consideration that this schedule is different from what we have done in the past, we announced it early for people to plan accordingly. Seminars of this caliber are not inexpensive to host. It has been years in the planning to be able to do so financially. Education is one of the PCT's goals. But it is ultimately the support of the Pom fancy that makes this possible. So hopefully, this sheds some light onto what went into making this decision and that you are able to attend this renowned presentation: Pat Hastings' Puppy Puzzle. 

#### Our question for this issue is: My Pom puppy keeps eating her stools. How can I get her to stop?

Coprophagia or stool eating can be an unhealthy and extremely annoying problem for dog owners. The following suggestions may help:

Certain parasites, infections, or digestive enzyme deficiencies can increase stool-eating behavior. Take a stool sample to your veterinarian for testing. If parasites are a problem, your veterinarian can prescribe appropriate treatment. If digestive enzyme deficiencies are the problem, pet supplements that contain digestive enzymes can be used.

Probiotic supplements (beneficial bacteria) and canine multi vitamin/mineral supplements are also helpful in many cases. A good source for pet supplements is www.kvvet.com.

Feed only premium food. Low-quality foods contain ingredients that are difficult to digest, which may contribute to stool eating.

Try pouring a little V8 or tomato juice over food daily. As long as your dog is not allergic to tomatoes, this can work very well. Adding canned pumpkin to food and sprinkling a little garlic powder over food can also help.

Clean fecal matter promptly so there is less chance of your dog ingesting his stools.

Provide toys and other diversions so that your dog doesn't play with or eat stools out of boredom.

If none of these suggestions work, a pet product called For-Bid or Monosodium Glutamate can be used to impart a foul taste to the stools. I prefer to try the healthier suggestions above first and would only try MSG if all else fails.

#### Our next question is: How can I safely eliminate doggie odors in my home?

A Kennel visit to Idlewyld Pomeranians

Hi! Come in. Would you like some coffee or tea? Welcome to Idlewyld. I just love having visitors who like to talk about dogs.

Idlewyld is a 7 bedroom colonial house on 13 acres in rural Goochland County, half way between Richmond and Charlottesville. We attended an obedience seminar conducted by Merrill Cohen (now deceased), both a conformation and obedience judge. After much begging, the breeder relented and sold her to me. That little red sable became my first champion.

Marlene Scott put the majors on Trinket. After that I've mostly shown my dogs myself, with some help from Rachal. Elaine put the last major on TJ. I've also finished dogs for other people in conformation and obedience. I was so pleased to finish two blacks back to back. Rachal and Elaine competed in Junior Showmanship with various Poms. Both were very skilled and nationally ranked.

Over the years, my philosophy has been to breed for soundness, hoping for a dog that could be successful in both conformation and obedience. I wanted good legs and a pretty outline, and let the color chips fall

where they may. Occasionally, an unusual color would appear. In almost 40 years, I've had three creams. My first black and tan, Nikki was in a litter of four, both of whose parents were orange. I traced back six generations on the pedigree to find the Great recessive genes! Before he died (lacking one major), Nikki sired a litter of four; three black and tans survived! I sold one to a marvelous pet home. The other two were Phred (Ch Idlewyld Semi-Precious Gem and Lizzie (Ch Idlewyld Basic Black N Pearls CD). After

that, the supply of black and tans just dried up. Now I'm showing a little spitfire I coown with breeder Kay Lyman. He's half my breeding as I bred his father, Mouse (Ch. Idlewylds Pocket Change of Tramark).

About six years ago, I bought a bitch puppy from Ken Griffith who grew up to be Ch Idlewyld Piper of Lenette, taking breeds and group placements from the Puppy Class along the way. A deep orange, she was bred to TJ (Ch Idlewyld Tourmaline). There were two females and a male, Gemmy, in the litter.

He appeared to be a dark orange until after he finished. Rachal kept saying to keep him as he was a specials dog. Sure enough, he matured into a deep, eye-catching red with an amazing side gate. He's the only dog I've ever seriously specialled. The first year he was out, he had climbed to number seven in the rankings when he was bitten by a poisonous copperhead snake. Miraculously, he survived, but his coat was destroyed by the toxin. He was through showing for the year. Last year I brought him out again, and he was steadily moving up in the rankings when I became ill, and we were out for the rest of the year. This year, I did not attempt to show him; I can take a hint! However, his daughter Fire, also a deep red, gave me a lot of fun this year. She began by taking her class at the National, then WB, BW, BOS for a huge 5 point major the day after the National in Louisville. She was WB, BOS at the Delaware Valley Toy Dog Fanciers, finished at the PCCV supported entry-winning Best in Sweepstakes and WB, then followed up by winning Grand Futurity Winner in the PCCV Futurity. I am hoping to keep the red and black and tan colors going.

I've alternated showing in conformation and obedience with both the Poms and the



honorary Poms, the Greyhounds. Some years would see me out with two or three Poms in conformation, then I'd disappear, and hit the obedience trials for a while. I am very proud of the 19 obedience titles my Poms have earned. This year I discovered the fun of Rally Obedience. It's sort of a combination of obedience, agility, and what we old-time trainers call "doodling", a way of refining heeling. With only five and half weeks of training, I entered littermates Trove and Cammy at the APC National in Rally, and wow! Not only did both qualify, but both took placements. And I was hooked again! Cammy is working on her rally advanced and open obedience. Trove is still working on his CD. And Greyhound Breeze will be out in Rally

I've also spent a lot of time and energy on dog clubs. My first club was Richmond Dog Obedience Club, where I have served as Instructor, Demonstration Chair, Trial Chair and Secretary, and President. I was recently elected to the Board. I was on the Board of the American Pomeranian Club for about 15 years, including four years as President. I'm also a member of the Pomeranian Club of Greater Baltimore and active in the Pomeranian Club of Central Virginia.

Novice soon.

Some accomplishments have eluded me. I've never gotten a BIS. But there are two records of which I am VERY proud. One is I bred, owned, and showed the only dual-titled Pom (Ch Lavalier CDX HOF) both of whose parents were dual-titled (Ch Idlewyld Gemstone CDX ex Ch Idlewyld Star Pendant CD ROM). The other is I've finished the most dual-titled Poms-eight. Seven of those were homebred.

The goal of trying to breed that really great dog, the challenge of trying to train the sparkling performance, the gratification of serving the clubs that advance the breed are all quite important. But in the end, the people who share all that with you are what memories are made of . I've been truly blessed by a husband who is willing to stay home and be kennel help, by daughters who understand and share my joys and frustrations, and by fellow breeders and exhibitors who share, who cheer, who commiserate, who make it all fun. Thank you all.

#### JANESA POMERANIANS "The Mystery Kennel Visit"

Once upon a time, long long ago... no seriously, as far back as I can remember there were always dogs. My father always had a few beagles for hunting. When I was four years old my sister and I each received rat terriers as childhood pets. When I was twelve, I raised an orphaned 13" beagle puppy I named "Nancy" by bottle-feeding her canned milk. Nancy became mine and was my first experience with breeding after she grew up. Nancy had several litters of beagle puppies for me in Washington DC as a teenager. After the war was over, we left DC and moved to Lake Charles Louisiana. I was a sophomore in high school when we moved from Lake Charles to Morgan City to be closer to where my father worked.

Morgan City, Louisiana is about 90 miles southwest of New Orleans. A beautiful bayou runs across the back of my property. I love it here. Many of my northern friends tease

me about living in the swamp itself, but I will never leave. This is home to me and to Janesa Pomeranians.

Married with four young children, I recall purchasing a dog as our family pet in the late 60s. In spite of not knowing any better and purchasing our miniature schnauzer "Mister" from a pet store, he was a wonderful pet. When he was about eighteen months old, outside playing and pottying under my watchful eye, a car pulled up and the door opened. Mister hopped in and the car drove off. We never saw him again.

I then did some investigating to find a breeder. I made arrangements to purchase another schnauzer and to meet a breeder at a dog show to pick one up. I was fascinated by the dog show. I spent the entire day there, looking at dogs and talking to people. That trip was the beginning of my interest in showing dogs. At that show I saw families and kids and it seemed like it would be a great thing to do as a hobby with my children. As



time went on, I purchased several schnauzers. I started showing schnauzers and bred a couple of litters. I did not have much success in the schnauzer show ring and did not enjoy stripping terrier coats. My children all came to shows with me until they turned sixteen. At sixteen, they could decide to come to the show or to stay home. Joseph Jr, Kenneth, Brian and Vanessa were all successful in the conformation ring, earning many points on our dogs. I enjoyed spending time with all of them at shows and have fond memories of when they traveled with me. When the kids were young, I recall a show that I had taken some Demerol for pain in my feet and while I was in the ring I started seeing colors and felt myself slipping to the floor. Friends caught me and others caught my schnauzer and got me out of the ring. After I had surgery on my feet, it became imperative that I find a breed that I did not have to run with in the show ring. I began searching for a breed I would enjoy and be able to show without running.

I was at a dog show in the 70s and saw Al Williamson showing CH Chloe's April Doll. I immediately knew I wanted a whole

herd of exactly what she was, a Pomeranian. She was typey, small, orange and hairy. I began my search for ones like her. We all know how hard that search can be for the first show pom, the first good poms for breeding and for a breeder that is willing to trust a person new to the breed. I bought poms and placed poms, bought more poms and placed more poms. At the time, there were no other show breeders in the area. I acquired "Dancer", Sugarland's Flamingo Dancer, from Gwen Hodges and she was my first pom of quality. She had several litters and I kept every daughter out of her. One of her daughters went on to become my first champion CH Janesa's Rock N-Ubet whom I called "Ubet." At that time, I was working with

Rose Anne Jones and together we bought several boys from Morris Carson of Emcee Poms. I sent several girls to be bred to those Emcee boys. When Rose Anne retired, I acquired all of the poms and forged ahead. It was the poms, my kids and I.

My daughter, Vanessa could hold her own at a dog show. There was a Pomeranian exhibitor who was quite large and liked to outshine her in the ring and was always blocking the judge's view of this cute petite child. One day she decided she had enough of the unfair sportsmanship and made it a point to not allow this handler to block the judge's view of herself and her dog. To accomplish this she took a step forward each time the handler blocked her. Each time the handler moved forward a step, Vanessa moved forward three steps. They nearly waltzed across the ring this way, almost to the point of passing up the judge. By the time they were on top of the judge, the handler gave up and Vanessa won. Not surprising, after that day, that handler never tried to block her again.

Vanessa was very interested in dogs and dog shows and totally involved in the early years. My kennel name "Janesa" is a combination of the "J" from Jerrie and the "anesa" from Vanessa. During her early teens she went to all of the shows with me and showed the poms. When she was sixteen she discovered one boy and "Buster" went on to become her future husband, to whom she is married to this day. She lost interest in showing, but still has a dog.

I had no mentor. There was no Internet; no pom people at shows in our area; long-distance phone calls were expensive and there were no cell phones or free minutes. I've attended every National Specialty since 1986 in my quest to see and learn as much as I can about poms. In 1983 I went on a trip to a computer school for the company that I worked for. While I was away in Charlotte NC, I went to visit Ruth Beam of Great Elms Poms. During that visit I saw a puppy bitch that Ruth bred who was sold to Beverly Norris, Bev-Nors Missy Miss. I expressed an interest with Beverly in acquiring one of her sons someday, preferably bred to her CH Bev-Nors Toasted Fudge or a Fudge son. Later when Bev-Nors Missy Miss was bred to Fudge, I was able to acquire a wonderful dog who went on to become CH Bev-Nors Toastmaster ROM, "Master" and one of the foundation



CH BEV-NORS TOASTMASTER ROM dogs of my breeding program. I bought several girls from Beverly Norris, as well. I also bought two girls from Lennis Rains of Lennis

bought two girls from Lennis Rains of Lennis Poms who were out of CH Lennis's-Tar-Baby-Of-Great Elms ROM, a black and tan.

I read every issue of The Pomeranian Review with great interest and a desire to learn. It seemed in every issue that I read about poms dying at young ages. Not wanting to have poms dying young, I began a search for the oldest poms I could find that were still producing. I found two boys. Neither were show dogs, but did continue to produce into their teens. I acquired both boys around 9 or 10 years of age. One was a chocolate boy named Prince Cho-Ko who was fondly called "Cho-Ko" and the other was a black and tan boy named Rosewood's Timstopper's Shadow, whom I called "Shadow." Both boys made an

impact on longevity in my breeding program. Both boys are also largely responsible for the colors of chocolate and black and tan seen in my breeding program to this day. Even though black and tan was not a recognized color at that time, I was very smitten by its beauty.

In the early days, I finished a few girls. I learned a lot by trial and error. From the learning process, I agree with many of today's experts who say to buy the very best girls that you can afford to buy. Girls are the backbone of your breeding program. That said, most girls never have enough puppies to be exceptionally noteworthy. Over the years, I've had my most success by line breeding. I try to breed type to type. After I've done enough line breeding, I will outcross for specific traits and then I come right back into what I'm used to working with and line-breed some more. It is always more important to breed for soundness over type. If I had it to do over, I wish that I could have bought two really good broods instead of twenty-five mediocre dogs and had to spay and neuter and place the majority of them to get quality. Two other things can help along the way, having a prepotent stud dog and having simple good luck.

As I have said, girls are the backbone of a breeding program. Boys however are the dogs that seem to be remembered. The boys that make the biggest impact in a breeding program go on to be remembered because of the many offspring that they have and the quality and consistency of those offspring. I would like to mention some of the males that have had an impact at Janesa Poms over the years.

After Prince Cho-Ko and Rosewood's Timstopper's Shadow made their impact on longevity, the next male was "Gambler" CH Janesa's Whatta Gambler. He gave me pretty heads and was an offspring of my first champion CH Janesa's Rock N-Ubet.

"Master," from Beverly Norris made the next impact. He went on to become CH Bev-Nors Toastmaster ROM and was the sire of thirteen champions. Master gave me the bone, substance and type that I was searching for. Master was shown to his championship by Charlotte Creed of Southland Poms and myself.

In the late eighties three dogs were born that would make all the difference at Janesa Poms. I saw "Tally" as a young dog. He could pick up a tennis ball and run with it. I was immediately crazy about the dog. Thankfully for me, he was a noisy dog and considered not easy to live with. I jumped at the opportunity to co-own him with Cheryl Jackson and Joel Taylor of Glen Iris Poms. He was a striking black and tan and became my next love. He was shown to his championship by his co-owners Cheryl and Joel and was bred

by Cassandra Evans of Wee Hearts Poms. He became CH Weehearts Glen Iris Talisman ROM and the sire of thirteen champions. He

was a wonderful gentleman and gave me everything I wanted no matter what he was bred to. He was my outcross to the Master children Black and tan was acceptable by then in the show ring, but still difficult to finish. "Commander" CH Sun-Dots Command Performance came from Dudley Roach and "Tuff" CH Moreno's Tuff To Top came from

Julie Moreno (Moreno Poms) and Dolly Trauner (Phyner Poms). Both dogs were finished when they came to live with me and both were great outcrosses to my linebred girls. Tuff was a magnificent black dog and was used a lot in my chocolate breeding program and Commander added clear colors to my orange breeding program.

The early nineties brought two dogs that were exceptionally cute. First was "Wags" CH Janesa's Very Special Jan-Shar, whose tail never stopped wagging. He was cute, little and made me smile. He is the only pom that I never had to housebreak. In 1995 he won an Award of Merit at Westminster, handled by Hiram Stewart. Second was "Arnie" CH Jan-Shars The Terminator Of Janesa, who was a gift from Sharon Hanson of Jan-Shar Poms. Arnie was a living doll, cute, little and made puppies with beautiful heads. Arnie gave me many clear colors and was as sweet as they come. Arnie is also the sire of the next two dogs to make an impact at Janesa.

Arnie's boys "Sake" and "HP" have been invaluable to me. "HP" is CH Janesa's Hush Puppy. HP gave me strength. He has legs of steel and he was my first climber. HP can climb out of anything. Whatever run he is in when visiting anywhere, must have a roof. In roofless yards, HP climbs from yard to yard to check on any girls that might be available. "Sake" is CH Janesa's For Keep-Sake ROMX

and Sake was my second climber. Presently, Sake is still siring puppies at eleven years of age. When Sake was a puppy he had light colored hairs on two of his back toes. I tried for almost a year to sell him to anyone and everyone that wanted a puppy. I couldn't sell him no matter how hard I tried. By the time he was a young adult, the light hairs were hardly detectable on his creamy orange legs and I was able to see his beautiful shoulders and head. Carolyn Crockett and I showed Sake to his championship and I will always be grateful that no one wanted to buy him. He has made a lasting mark here and is in many of the pedigrees for dogs that are born here now. Sake has currently sired seventeen champions.

"Hurrah" has left a legacy here of beautiful daughters and several champion sons. Jan-Shars N Janesa's Hurrah was a son of Tookeyes The Goldsmith ROMX imported from England by Sharon Hanson. Hurrah would have been a larger boy in the ring during his youth, but could have been finished today when larger poms seem to be more noticed in the ring. He was another wonderful outcross to my line bred girls.

Just beginning to make an impact at Janesa's currently are CH Janesa's Don't Kiss and Tell, (sired by CH Raine N Janesa's Time To Chat) and CH Janesa's Hip Hip Hurrah, (sired by Hurrah). Presently, I have a tightly line-bred son of Sake's that is beginning to make his mark named "Bravo", CH Janesa's Applause, Please. Bravo is already the sire of

four champions. I consider Bravo to be the closest Pom that I have bred to the Pom Standard. I must also mention other stud dogs that are not mine that have made an impact at Janesa Poms over recent years. "Boofa" Dochlaggie Devils Snow, was a white dog bred by Denise Leo of Dochlaggie Poms in Australia. Boofa made an impact by improving my white breeding program and giving me many white carriers. "Chance" a short backed heavy sable boy CH Janesa's N Jan-Shars Chance ROM sired two Janesa champions and is owned and loved by Camilla Knight of Sundown Poms. "Lucky" was an elegant cream boy CH Mystars



Bon Chance that was co-owned with Barbara Messmer of Bar-Jon Poms. Lucky helped improve my cream program and was out of white breeding. "Zeke" is BISS CH Sundown's Hide N Zeke CD ROMX GC and has fabulous shoulder layback and has sired seven Janesa champions. Zeke belongs to Carol Leemhuis of Carleez Poms. "Dakota" CH Heartland's Knight N Day ROM has most recently been used to improve my chocolate program and he has sired three Janesa champions including my first chocolate champion. Dakota has an exceptional tail set and is owned by Laurie Otis of Horizon Poms.

In the early nineties I showed several poms in obedience, first was Janesa's Southland Tanner. "Tanner" taught me patience and how

to train a dog for each obedience exercise. Tanner is the mother of three noteworthy offspring; CH Janesa Penru's Dixieland Jazz, Janesa's Rah Rah CDX NA and Janesa's Tiffany Is An Angel UD RAE NA NAJ HOF. Next I trained "Daisey" CH Janesa's Hi-Struttin Daisey. Training for obedience teaches how

to train a dog complex exercises and by doing so, we learn how the dogs think and how to best communicate with each individual personality.

I feel that there are several health problems in the breed that we need to be watching for and trying to prevent. First is

Alopecia X which has been increasingly prevalent in recent years and frequently observed in the show ring in its' early stages; second would be thyroid problems; third would be trachea problems, and fourth would be luxating patellas. If we would all be honest and have our dogs evaluated by veterinarians for detectable problems instead of guessing if a problem exists, such as thyroid problems, trachea problems and luxating patellas, we would save ourselves heartache in future years. Finding at least one really good vet is essential to long-term success.

My biggest disappointment has been the expanding number of poms with Alopecia X today. It is a problem that I absolutely hate and I have little tolerance for it and would like to have a test or marker to completely breed away from it. I don't want any part of it! It seems to just keep getting worse instead of better in the show world. I personally feel that to get better control over this problem that it is best to breed a male only once or twice while they are young. This is to teach them how to breed and prove that they can sire puppies. After that, I do not feel they should be regularly bred until they are over three to five years of age. If we would all wait to use the majority of boys until after they were five (or at least three), we would eliminate a lot of sires that go on to become bald after siring a large number of puppies. The other thing we can each do is to actually see the males we are planning to breed to. It is useful to see that a male is still in good health, can still walk on his legs, isn't honking like a goose and still has healthy hair. If we see dogs that appear to be a problem or definitely are a problem, don't breed to them. We can all help to find studies to find solutions and support researchers and veterinarians who want to help us. We can donate money, donate pom blood samples and donate our pedigrees. We are all needed to be a part of the solution.

Because I had no mentor, I am to this day willing to help new people that are willing to listen and learn. There is an old saying, "Dance with the one that brung ya." I like to tell new people this should be their philosophy for success. Find a type that you like and someone that is breeding that type and then stick with it! If you like X type of Pomeranians, buy X type of Pomeranians from one or two breeders that have that line of dogs. Line-breed those dogs and stick to it. So many new people make the mistake of buying "one of these" and "one of those" sometimes from ten different lines and then they try to breed them all together. Get something that is working for someone whose dogs you admire and stick to what they have done for at least three years

to five years. After that time, you can usually add to what you have and bring something different that is an outcross back into what you have.

The show ring is where many of us get to see all of our hard work come together. Raising pom puppies certainly has many low points and sad points. Watching people that are new to the breed raise youngsters and show them with top success is always a pleasure. There have been a few winners in the past decade that made me smile because I've bred one or both of their parents and helped their breeders through some early learning in poms. BIS BISS CH AJ's Smokin Joe ROMX GC HOF, known fondly as "Frazier" was a stunning heavy sable bred and owned by Jerry & Ashley Miller of AJ Poms, finishing number one in the country in 1999. "Keegan," CH Sundown's Keegan Xavier ROM GC another orange sable finished number two in the country in 2004 bred, owned and handled by Camilla Knight of Sundown Poms. "Zeke," BISS CH Sundown's Hide N Zeke CD ROMX GC was owner handled to the top ten for two years in 2002 and 2003 by Carol Leemhuis of Carleez Poms and bred by Camilla. These are all great success stories of poms descended from Janesa poms. "Baxter" BISS CH Rivendell Applauds Janesa was co-bred by myself and his owner, Carolyn Bonin of Rivendell Poms and was the number four pom in 2006, breeder/owner handled by Carolyn. "Indy" CH Horizon-N-Janesa Indian Sundown was ranked in 2006 owned and handled by Laurie Otis of Horizon Poms and co-bred by Laurie, Camilla and myself. All of these poms are beautiful examples of the breed. Each of them had exceptional showmanship and movement and were balanced enough to be worthy of the top rankings.

I always enjoy showing my own poms. However, my time is always limited and even more limited are the directions that I can travel living on the southern coast of Louisiana. I can only go north. This limits the number of dog shows that are within my range. As a result, I have had the help of numerous people who have shown my dogs over the past years. Years ago I had the help of Charlotte Creed, Hiram Stewart, Cheryl Jackson, Joel Taylor and Nadine Hersil who finished CH Janesa's Forever The Star, "Ringo." In more recent years I have had the help of Carolyn Crockett who helped to show "Sake" and finished "Gucci" CH Janesa's Fashion Statement.

Most recently I've had the help of a wonderful group of ladies who have helped me to get many poms finished. I am grateful for their hard work.


I'd like to thank my traveling companions from the area for traveling with me to many shows over the past many years; Rose Anne Jones, Charlotte Creed and Barbara

#### SPECIALTY CLUB DIRECTORY.

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The question of color in Pomeranians is one demanding serious consideration. "The recognized colors at the present time are white, black, brown, blue, orange and shaded sable, surely a pretty liberal classification," says Stanley Mappin in the English Kennel Gazette. "And it would be well for the broad if no other colors than these were recognized. Recently the following new colors have made their appearance: Creams, which are a had colored white; fawns, bad light colored browns; beavers, which are what their owners like to describe them, according to the classification at the show at which they are to be exhibited; orange shaded sables, a most inexplicable color, which no one but the owner can define; and, last but most difficult of all to tabulate, brindle shaded sables.

All the above should be classified with the parti-colored, and should be entered in the class provided for them at every show, vix., that for "any other color,"

At one notable American show the absurd situation was presented by owners of blacks, etc., with entries, and not only claiming but receiving recognition, in the any-other-color class, because all the colors excluded were not specified, though there were other special classes for the blacks and the browns. Could anything have been more unreasonable, when every Pomeranian breeder knows, or should know, that the any-other-color class is for parti-colors, or for self-colored types not given special classification?

Every one is agreed as to the definition of the color of the black, brown or white and of the blue, but the definition "shaded sable" is very elastic. There is but one true shaded sable, and with this true type in his mind a judge should penalize all those whose color is not up to the correct standard.

Oranges are the worst offenders of all, the majority being absolutely devoid of any pretensions to the true color. Most of those shown as oranges, though often good dogs in other respects, have no earthly right to be in an orange class, and in fairness to exhibitors of the correct color it is the duty of the judge to turn them out of the ring without a prize.

In the brown, too, there is grent variation of that. Miss Sturges's wonderful Chocolate Flyer is a true type of the perfect chocolate shade of brown so highly prized, deservedly admired, but rarely seen. Flyer is the most correct brown Pom in this country, and had the same said of him in England before he was imported.

Ch. Haughty Prince, Mr. Houlker owner, and Ch. Pomeria Checolate Fly, one of Miss Ives's keanels, are the most noted browns in England, and are examples of the correct depth of color. They are far famed among the enthusiasts for this color, the richest of all in Poms, and next to the orange, the most difficult to breed to true type.

Miss Anna Lands is the fortunate owner of a wonderful colored blue Pomeranian, her lively little Lulu. Its deep, true blue; its profuse cont, general sturdiness, yet its min-

inture size, make it attract attention every-

It is not too obvious to say that when each separate color is being judged the judge should keep in view exclusively a very strict standard of each, and turn out of the ring any bad colored specimens in any class that appear before him. In justice to the judge as well as the dogs, Poms should never be judged under any but a clear daylight, the inte afternoons or the calcium being utterly out of place as making it impossible to accurately judge comparative depths of color or defects in shading.

The way ring stewarding of Pomeronians is too frequently carried out is really painful. To conscientiously perform the duties of a ring steward for a breed like the Poms is really hard work, and is not a task that should ever be undertaken lightly.

No matter how good in points, a few white hairs handleap an animal. The colors in parti-colored dogs ought to be evenly distributed. In a competition of whole and mixed colored dogs the former have preference. A whole colored dog having white hair on the feet or on one foot cannot compete in a whole colored class. The all white must be absolutely free from any lemon or shading of any color whatever. A white dog with just a streak or two of dark markings here and there cannot be reckoned a parti-color, and should not have a place in any class. Too often a black dog with a little white on the chest is entered for competition and obtains a prize, but judges should remember that whole colored dogs in whole colored classes deserve the places.

In parti-colored dogs the colors should be evenly distributed on the bedy in patches. A dog with a white foot or a white chest is not a parti-color. Whole colored dogs with a white foot or feet, leg or legs are the most objectionable, and are at once to be disqualified from competing as a whole colored specimen, and should be excluded from particolored classes, as they are not true particelors.

In mixed classes where self-colored specimens and parti-colored Pomeranians compete together, the preference should be given, if in other points they are equal, to the selfcolored or whole colored specimen.

Shaded sables must be shaded throughout with three or more colors as uniformly as possible, and with no patches of self-color.

Ominges must be self-colored throughout, and light shading, though not actually disqualifying, should be severely discountenanced.

Dogs with false markings make good pets, nevertheless, and can be sold at specially moderate prices for this purpose, but should never be intruded in the show ring. However, in selling them for pets, their disqualifications should be pointed out, as the prospective buyer may later wish to become an exhibitor. Disqualifying faults of any breed should honestly be acknowledged in the selling of a dog, especially to an inexperienced and trusting purchaser. Otherwise the money is obtained under false pretences, as every purchaser assumes that a dog is perfect unless otherwise pointed out, and has the right to that standpoint under the law.

In addition to color breeders should grasp the fact that the best judges will not recognize a diminutive, badly conditioned little weed over a sturdy, better type though heavier dog. The only way to obtain correct type is to breed from healthy bitches of sound constitution with a weight of not less than five pounds. Have nothing to do with breeding from an undersized weakling merely for size, who only perpetuates a type which is even worse than that of her progenitors.

Good judges and all those who have the welfare of the breed at heart do not care about size, and a good dog is not now handlcapped in the show ring because he weighs seven pounds.

It may be said without fear of contradiction that in the majority of cases the smaller the Pomeranian in similar proportion do his points deteriorate—bad head with too prominent eyes, soft, flat cost, long back, ansoundness on legs; and the texture of the cost being common faults. In diminutive show "runts" the cost is more like silk than

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hair, instead of stand-off, spiky and all that the cost of a Pomeranian should be.

The American Pomeranian Club, under its new secretary and with its increasing mem-bership, nell take a stand to the fore in pro-moting the true type of the Pom in this country. All frauds in exhibiting and breed-ing are to be severely discountenanced, and hardsome prizes are to be offered for the encouragement of breeders and owners who strive to achieve the perfect standard.


















Purina Parent Club Partnership (PPCP) Program

Members of Purina Pro Club whose national parent club participates in the Purina Parent Club Partnership (PPCP) Program may earn funding for canine health studies, education and/or rescue efforts that will benefit their breed. Since 2002, the first year of the PPCP program, there has been more than \$710,000 generated for health research, education or rescue. As of 2005, there are 149 National breed clubs participating in the program.

Here's how the PPCP Program works: Pro Club members redeem weight circles from bags of participating Purina brand dog foods. Purina tracks these weight circle submissions, and for every \$100 of qualifying weight circle points earned by Pro Club members, Purina donates \$10 to the participating national parent breed club.

Points are accumulated throughout a calendar year, and in February, a check representing 10 percent of the value of the submitted weight circles for the year is evenly split between the participating national parent breed club and the AKC Canine Health Foundation. The donation that goes to the AKC Canine Health Foundation is eligible to be matched up to 100 percent by the Canine Health Foundation if it meets the Foundation's funding guidelines.

Purina sent the year-end Parent Club Partnership Program report for 2006. APC had 793 Pro Club members declared for the program. There were 154 members that submitted weight circles from January through December 2006; the total earned by APC was \$4,382.05. Purina sent a check with their report made payable to APC in the amount of \$2,191.03; a second check for the same amount will be mailed by Purina to the Canine Health Foundation on behalf of APC.

As of 9/30/07 the American Pomeranian Club, Inc. has 898 members declared for the Purina Parent Club Partnership Program. From January 1, 2007, through September 30, 2007, 134 members have submitted weight circles resulting in a total of \$2,933.10 accumulated thus far for the 2007 Program.







#### "DEVELOPING HIGH ACHIEVERS"

Originally published as "Early Neurological Stimulation" By Carmen L. Battaglia

Surprising as it may seem, it isn't capacity that explains the differences that exist between individuals because most seem to have far more capacity than they will ever use. The differences that exist between individuals seem to be related to something else. The ones who achieve and out perform others seem to have within themselves the ability to use hidden resources. In other words, it's what they are able to do with what they have that makes the difference.


In many animal-breeding programs the entire process of selection and management is founded on the belief that performance is inherited. Attempts to analyze the genetics of performance in a systematic way have involved some distinguished names such as Charles Darwin and Francis Galton. But it has only been in recent decades that good estimates of heritability of performance have been based on adequate data. Cunningham (1991) in his study of horses found that only by using Timeform data, and measuring groups of half brothers and half sisters could good estimates of performance be determined. His data shows that performance for speed is about 35% heritable. In other words only about 35% of all the variation that is observed in track performance is controlled by heritable factors, the remaining 65% are attributable to other influences, such as training, management and nutrition. Cunningham's work while limited to horses provides a good basis for understanding how much breeders can attribute to the genetics and the pedigrees.

Researchers have studied this phenomena and have looked for new ways to stimulate individuals in order to improve their natural abilities. Some of the methods discovered have produced life long lasting effects. Today, many of the differences between individuals can now be explained by the use of early stimulation methods.

#### Introduction

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Man for centuries has tried various methods to improve performance. Some of the methods have stood the test of time, others have not. Those who first conducted research on this topic believed that the period of early age was a most important time for stimulation because of its rapid growth and development. Today, we know that early life is a time when the physical immaturity of an organism is susceptible

and responsive to a restricted but important class of stimuli. Because of its importance many studies have focused their efforts on the first few months of life.

Newborn pups are uniquely different than adults in several respects. When born their eyes are closed and their digestive system has a limited capacity requiring periodic stimulation by their dam who routinely licks them in order to promote digestion. At this age they are only able to smell, suck, and crawl. Body temperature is maintained by snuggling close to their mother or by crawling into piles with other littermates. During these first few weeks of immobility researchers noted that these immature and under-developed canines are sensitive to a restricted class of stimuli which includes thermal, and tactile stimulation, motion and locomotion.

Other mammals such as mice and rats are also born with limitations and they also have been found to demonstrate a similar sensitivity to the effects of early stimulation. Studies show that removing them from their nest for three minutes each day during the first five to ten days of life causes body temperatures to fall below normal. This mild form of stress is sufficient to stimulate hormonal, adrenal and pituitary systems. When tested later as adults, these same animals were better able to withstand stress than littermates who were not exposed to the same early stress exercises. As adults, they responded to stress in "a graded" fashion, while their non-stressed littermates responded in an "all or nothing way."

Data involving laboratory mice and rats also shows that stress in small amounts can produce adults who respond maximally. On the other hand, the results gathered from non-stressed littermate show that they become easily exhausted and would near death if exposed to intense prolonged stress. When tied down so they were unable to move for twenty-four hours, rats developed severe stomach ulcers, but litter mates exposed to early stress handling were found to be more resistant to stress tests and did not show evidence of ulcers. A secondary affect was also noticed.

Sexual maturity was attained sooner in the littermates given early stress exercises. When tested for differences in health and disease, the stressed animals were found to be more resistant to certain forms of cancer and infectious diseases and could withstand terminal starvation and exposure to cold for longer periods than their non-stressed littermates. Other studies involving early stimulation exercises have been successfully performed on both cats and dogs. In these studies, the Electrical Encephalogram (EEG) was found to be ideal for measuring the electrical activity in the brain because of its extreme sensitivity to changes in excitement, emotional stress, muscle tension, changes in oxygen and breathing. EEG measures show that pups and kittens when given early stimulation exercises mature at faster rates and perform better in certain problem solving tests than non-stimulated mates.

In the higher level animals the effect of early stimulation exercises have also been studied. The use of surrogate mothers and familiar objects were tested by both of the Kelloggs' and Dr. Yearkes using young chimpanzees. Their pioneer research shows that the more primates were deprived of stimulation and interaction during early development, the less able they were to cope, adjust and later adapt to situations

While experiments have not yet produced specific information about the optimal amounts of stress needed to make young animals psychologically or physiologically superior, researches agree that stress has value. What also is known is that a certain amount of stress for one may be too intense for another, and that too much stress can retard development. The results show that early stimulation exercises can have positive results but must be used with caution. In other words, too much stress can cause pathological adversities rather than physical or psychological superiority.

#### **Methods of Stimulation**

as adults.

The U.S. Military in their canine program developed a method that still serves as a guide to what works. In an effort to improve the performance of dogs used for military purposes, a program called "Bio Sensor" was developed. Later, it became known to the public as the "Super Dog" Program. Based on years of research, the military learned that early neurological stimulation exercises could have important and lasting effects. Their studies confirmed that there are specific time periods early in life when neurological stimulation has optimum results. The first period involves a window of time that begins at the third day of life and lasts until the sixteenth day. It is believed that because this interval of time is a period of rapid neurological growth and development, and therefore is of great importance to the individual.

The "Bio Sensor" program was also concerned with early neurological stimulation in order to give the dog a superior advantage. Its development utilized six exercises which were designed to stimulate the neurological system. Each workout involved handling puppies once each day. The workouts required handling them one at a time while performing a series of five exercises. Listed in order of preference the handler starts with one pup and stimulates it using each of the five exercises. The handler completes the series from beginning to end before starting with the next pup. The handling of each pup once per day involves the following exercises:

- Tactical stimulation (between toes)
- 2. Head held erect
- 3. Head pointed down
- Supine position
- Thermal stimulation.

#### 1. Tactile stimulation

Holding the pup in one hand, the handler gently stimulates (tickles) the pup between the toes on any one foot using a Qtip. It is not necessary to see that the pup is feeling the tickle. Time of stimulation 3 - 5 seconds. (Figure 1)

#### 2. Head held erect

Using both hands, the pup is held perpendicular to the ground, (straight up), so that its head is directly above its tail. This is an upwards position. Time of stimulation 3 - 5 seconds (Figure 2).

#### 3. Head pointed down

Holding the pup firmly with both hands the head is reversed and is pointed downward so that it is pointing towards the ground. Time of stimulation 3 - 5 seconds (Figure 3).

#### 5. Thermal stimulation

Use a damp towel that has been cooled in a refrigerator for at least five minutes. Place the pup on the towel, feet down. Do not restrain it from moving. Time of stimulation 3-5 seconds. (Figure 5)

#### 4. Supine position

Hold the pup so that its back is resting in the palm of both hands with its muzzle facing the ceiling. The pup while on its back is allowed to sleep struggle. Time of stimulation 3-5 seconds. (Figure 4)

These five exercises will produce neurological stimulations, none of which naturally occur during this early period of life. Experience shows that sometimes pups will resist these exercises, others will appear unconcerned. In either case a caution is offered to those who plan to use them. Do not repeat them more than once per day and do not extend the time beyond that recommended for each exercise. Over stimulation of the neurological system can have adverse and detrimental results. These exercises impact the neurological system by kicking it into action earlier than would be normally expected. The result being an increased capacity that later will help to make the difference in its performance. Those who play with their pups and routinely handle them should continue to do so because the neurological exercises are not substitutions for routine handling, play socialization or bonding.

#### **Benefits of Stimulation**

Five benefits have been observed in canines that were exposed to the Bio Sensor stimulation exercises. The benefits noted were:

- Improved cardio vascular performance (heart rate) 1.
- 2. Stronger heart beats
- 3. Stronger adrenal glands
- More tolerance to stress and 4.
- 5. Greater resistance to disease.

In tests of learning, stimulated pups were found to be more active and were more exploratory than their non-stimulated littermates over which they were dominant in competitive situations.

Early Neurological Stimulation Continued

Secondary effects were also noted regarding test performance. In simple problem solving tests using detours in a maze, the non-stimulated pups became extremely aroused, whined a great deal, and made many errors. Their stimulated littermates were less disturbed or upset by test conditions and when comparisons were made, the stimulated littermates were more calm in the test environment, made fewer errors and gave only an occasional distress when stressed. Socialization

As each animal grows and develops three kinds of stimulation have been identified that impact and influence how it will develop and be shaped as an individual. The first stage is called early neurological stimulation, and the second stage is called socialization. The first two (early neurological stimulation and socialization) have in common a window of limited time. When Lorenz, (1935) first wrote about the importance of the stimulation process he wrote about imprinting during early life and its influence on the later development of the individual. He states that it was different from conditioning in that it occurred early in life and took place very rapidly producing results which seemed to be permanent. One of the first and perhaps the most noted research efforts involving the larger animals was achieved by Kellogg & Kellogg (1933). As a student of Dr. Kellogg's I found him and his wife to have an uncanny interest in children and young animals and the changes and the differences that occurred during early development. Their history making study involved raising their own new born child with a new born primate. Both infants were raised together as if they were twins. This study like others that would follow attempted to demonstrate that among the mammals there are great differences in their speed of physical and mental development. Some are born relatively mature and quickly capable of motion and locomotion, while others are very immature, immobile and slow to develop. For example, the Rhesus monkey shows rapid and precocious development at birth, while the chimpanzee and the other "great apes" take much longer. Last and slowest is the human infant.

One of the earliest efforts to investigate and look for the existence of socialization in canines was undertaken by Scott-Fuller (1965). In their early studies they were able to demonstrate that the basic technique for testing the existence of socialization was to show how readily adult animals would foster young animals, or accept one from another species. They observed that with the higher level animals it is easiest done by hand rearing. When the foster animal transfers its social relationships to the new species, researchers conclude that socialization has taken place. Most researchers agree that among all species, a lack of adequate socialization generally results in unacceptable behavior and often times produces undesirable aggression, excessiveness, fearfulness, sexual inadequacy, and indifference toward partners.

Socialization studies confirm that the critical periods for humans (infant) to be stimulated are generally between three weeks and twelve months of age. For canines the period is shorter, between the fourth and sixteenth week of age. During these critical time periods two things can go wrong. First, insufficient social contact can interfere with proper emotional development which can adversely affected the development of the human bond. The lack of adequate social stimulation, such as handling, mothering and contact with others, adversely affects social and psychological development.


Second, over mothering can prevent sufficient exposure to other individuals, and situations that have an important influence on growth and development. The literature shows that humans and animals respond in similar ways when denied minimal amounts of stimulation. In humans, the absence of love and cuddling increases the risk of an aloof, distant, asocial or sociopathic individual. Over mothering can also have its detrimental effects. It occurs when a patient insulates the child from outside contacts, or keeps the apron strings tight, thus limiting opportunities to explore and interact. In the end, over mothering generally produces a dependent, socially maladjusted and sometimes emotionally disturbed individual.

The absence of outside social interactions for both children and pups usually results in a lack of adequate learning and social adjustment. Protected youngsters who grow up in an insulated environment often times become sickly, despondent, lacking in flexibility and unable to make simple social adjustments. Generally, they are unable to function productively or to interact successfully then they become adults.

Owners who have busy life styles with long and tiring work and social schedules often times cause pets to be neglected. Left to themselves with only an occasional trip out of the house or off of the property they seldom see other canines or strangers and generally suffer from poor stimulation and socialization. For many, the side effects of loneliness and boredom set-in. The resulting behavior manifests itself in the form of chewing, digging, and hard to control behavior (Battaglia).

It seems clear that small amounts of stress followed by early socialization can produce beneficial results. The danger seems to be in not knowing where the thresholds are for over and under stimulation. Many improperly socialized youngsters develop into older individuals unprepared for adult life, unable to cope with its challenges, and interactions. Attempts to re-socialize them when adults have only produced small gains. These failures confirm the notion that the window of time open for early neurological and social stimulation only comes once. After it passes, little or nothing can be done to overcome the negative effects of too much or too little stimulation.

The third and final stage in the process of growth and development is called enrichment. Unlike the first two stages it has no time limit and by comparison covers a very long period of time. Enrichment is a term which has come to mean the positive sum of experiences, which have a cumulative effect upon the individual. Enrichment experiences typically involve exposure to a wide variety of interesting, novel, and exciting experiences with regular opportunities to freely investigate, manipulate, and interact with them. When measured in later life, the results show that those reared in an enriched environment tend to be more inquisitive and are more able to perform difficult tasks. The educational TV program called Sesame Street is perhaps the best known example of a children's enrichment program. The results show



of the Sesame Street Program. There are numerous children studies that show the benefits of enrichment techniques and programs. Most focus on improving self-esteem and self-talk. Follow up studies show that the enriched Sesame Street students when later tested were brighter and scored above average and most often were found to be the products of environments that contributed to their superior test scores. On the other hand, those whose test scores were generally below average, (labeled as dull) and the products of underprivileged or non- enriched environments often times had little or only small amounts of stimulation during early childhood and only minimal amounts of enrichment during their developmental and formative years. Many were characterized as children who grew up with little interaction with others, poor parenting, few toys, no books and a steady diet of TV soap operas.

A similar analogy can be found among canines. All the time they are growing they are learning because their nervous systems are developing and storing information that may be of inestimable use at a later date. Studies by Scott and Fuller confirm that non-enriched pups when given free choice preferred to stay in their kennels. Other litter mates who were given only small amounts of outside stimulation between five and eight weeks of age were found to be very inquisitive and very active. When kennel doors were left open, the enriched pups would come bounding out while littermates who were not exposed to enrichment would remain behind. The non-stimulated pups would typically be fearful of unfamiliar objects and generally preferred to withdraw rather than investigate. Even well bred pups of superior pedigrees would not explore or leave their kennels and many were found difficult to train as adults. These pups in many respects were similar to the deprived children. They acted as if they had become institutionalized, preferring the routine and safe environment of their kennel to the stimulating world outside their immediate place of residence.

Regular trips to the park, shopping centers and obedience and agility classes serve as good examples of enrichment activities. Chasing and retrieving a ball on the surface seems to be enriching because it provides exercise and includes rewards. While repeated attempts to retrieve a ball provide much physical activity, it should not be confused with enrichment exercises. Such playful activities should be used for exercise and play or as a reward after returning from a trip or training session. Road work and chasing balls are not substitutes for trips to the shopping mall, outings or obedience classes most of which provide many opportunities for interaction and investigation.

Finally it seems clear that stress early in life can produce beneficial results. The danger seems to be in not knowing where the thresholds are for over and under stimulation. However, the absence or the lack of adequate amounts of stimulation generally will produce negative and undesirable results. Based on the above it is fair to say that the perfor-

mance of most individuals can be improved including the techniques described above. Each contributes in a cumulative way and supports the next stage of development.

#### Conclusion

Breeders can now take advantage of the information available to improve and enhance performance. Generally, genetics account of about 35% of the performance but the remaining 65% (management, training, nutrition) can make the difference. In the management category it has been shown that breeders should be guided by the rule that it is generally considered prudent to guard against under and over stimulation. Short of ignoring pups during their first two months of life, a conservative approach would be to expose them to children, people, toys and other animals on a regular basis. Handling and touching all parts of their anatomy is also necessary to learn as early as the third day of life. Pups that are handled early and on a regular basis, generally do not become hand shy as adults.

Because of the risks involved in under stimulation a conservative approach to using the benefits of the three stages has been suggested based primarily on the works of Arskeusky, Kellogg, Yearkes and the "Bio Sensor" program (later known as the "Super Dog Program").

Both experience and research have dominated the beneficial effects that can be achieved via early neurological stimulation, socialization and enrichment experiences. Each has been used to improve performance and to explain the differences that occur between individuals, their trainability, health and potential. The cumulative effects of the three stages have been well documented. They best serve the interests of owners who seek high levels of performance when properly used. Each has a cumulative effect and contributes to the development and the potential for individual performance.

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# National Parent Club Canine Health Conference

October 19 – 21, 2007 St. Louis, Missouri

I was pleased to have been one of approximately 350 attendees, and the APC representative, for this very informative conference, which was sponsored by Purina. The information was presented by some of the top research scientists in the country. A very diverse group was in attendance including representatives from parent clubs, veterinarians and veterinarian students, breeders, AKC judges, and personnel from CHIC, OFA, and Purina.

Over the course of 2 ½ days, the topics ranged from immunizations to cancer to cardiology and stem cell research. Some of the presentations were applicable to any breed, such as cancer therapy and some were specific to a particular breed such as ocular melanosis in the Cairn Terrier. On the topic of cancer, it was interesting to note that Pomeranians are considered to be at much lower risk of developing cancer in their lifetime than many of the other breeds.

Many of the parent clubs presented posters describing their approaches to health issues within their breeds and the genetic testing that is being conducted as they work to control and, in some cases, eradicate, health issues particular to their breeds. Although the parent clubs are at varying levels with their approach to

the specific issues of their breeds, many of them sponsor health and/or genetic testing clinics at their Nationals. A number of them have developed protocols and guidelines for health and genetic testing prior to breeding and many participate in the CHIC and OFA data bases. The veterinarians and veterinarian students were being encouraged to counsel their clients about health and genetic testing those breeders had done when they bring in their newly purchased puppies for their first health checks. In fact, there was a separate session for veterinarian students conducted by the CHIC representative on the subject of health and genetic testing and breeders use of the OFA and CHIC databases.


Upon completion of the mapping of the canine genome, researchers have a tool that allows the identification of genetic markers signifying some of these health issues with a much broader range and at a faster pace than ever before. Participants were given a complete listing, by breed and by disease type, of the genetic test currently available as of 9/27/07. As I reviewed the list, I was sad to see there are no tests specific to Pomeranians. Only one test was available to all breeds and that was the genetic test for the merle color. I am hopeful that some of the genetic tests identified for other breeds may

soon be also available for our Poms.

this seminar, at a later date. Likewise, these should be valuable resources for members. Responsible Breeding Management of Genetic Disease

Breeders of dogs desire to produce the best with their matings. However, breeding has become more complicated today, and more people with intact dogs are becoming "breeders". The most common inherited disorders for all dog breeds according to the AKC Canine Health Foundation are: cancer, eye disease, epilepsy, hip dysplasia, hypothyroidism, heart disease, autoimmune disease, allergies, patellar luxation, and renal dysplasia.

So, if breeders desire to produce the best with their matings, the basic question becomes, "Who is a reputable breeder?" For purposelybred dogs, it is those breeders who perform genetic testing for breedsusceptible disorders. Official test results should be made available to prospective breeders, and the pet and breeding-stock purchasing public. It doesn't matter whether a breeder is a large commercial breeder, or only

breeds once. In today's environment, not testing for documented breedrelated hereditary diseases is irresponsible breeding.

Responsible breeding also involves knowledge of how best to use the results of genetic testing. For purebreeds there are concerns about the breadth of the available gene pool and genetic diversity. Genetic test results should be used to benefit the overall health of breeds, not to limit it.

For direct genetic tests, official test results of the parents, and/or the offspring (tested prior to placement) should be made available to prospective breeders or purchasers of pet or breeding dogs. For disorders where there is no direct genetic test available, the knowledge of phenotypic test results (for affected, or carrier status if possible) should be made available in open health database registries.

Veterinarians should ask for pedigrees and results of parental or early age health testing of purebred and crossbred puppies on first presentation to their clinics. If the test results were not provided to the owner, many can be immediately searched in on-line databases like

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OFA or CHIC. A lack of available test results shows that the puppy was not purchased from a health conscious breeder, and it may be liable to develop genetic disease. The general public must be educated to become informed "consumers" when purchasing puppies.

The Canine Health Information Center (CHIC: www.caninehealthinfo.org) was established by the AKC Canine Health Foundation and the OF A assist breeds with managing bree specific genetic disorders. The A

Health Foundation and the OF A to assist breeds with managing breed-specific genetic disorders. The AKC national breed clubs determine the recommended testable disorders for the breed (whether tests of the phenotype or the genotype). The benefit of the CHIC system is that dogs gain CHIC certification by completing their health testing, regardless of their test results. CHIC is about health consciousness, not health perfection.

What Everyone Needs to Know About Canine Vaccines and Vaccination Programs Ron Schultz, PhD; University of Wisconsin - Madison

For many veterinary practitioners canine vaccination programs have been "practice management tools"



rather than medical procedures. Thus, it is not surprising that attempts to change the vaccines and vaccination programs based on scientific information have created great controversy and unique methods of resistance to the proposed changes have been and are being developed. For some practitioners the issues are not duration of immunity for the vaccines, or which vaccines are needed for the pet; instead, it is felt that every licensed vaccine should be given to every pet on an annual or more frequent basis.

The "core vaccines," those that every pup should receive and identified as core by most canine vaccine experts in the United States, include: 1)
Canine Parvovirus type 2 (CPV -2),
2) Canine Distemper virus (CDV), 3)
Canine Adenovirus type 2 (CA V-2),
4) Rabies Virus (RV).

As a minimum, puppies should be given at least one dose at 16 weeks of age or older. Preferably, they should be given three or more times starting at 6 to 9 weeks then at an interval of 2 to 4 weeks revaccinate 9 to 12 weeks then again at 14 to 16 weeks. It is critical that the last dose be given at 14 to 16 or more weeks of age. It is important not to give them earlier than 6 weeks unless there is a significant risk of a specific disease, and then give only the vaccine for the disease you want to prevent (e.g. CPV -2). Never vaccinate a pup less than 4 weeks of age. The most effective canine core products currently include modified live and recombinant vaccines alone or in combination.

After the puppy series is completed, revaccination is recommended again at one year of age or one year after the last puppy vaccination. Rabies must be given again at one year then every three years, whereas the other core vaccines need not be given again for at least three or more years. There is no benefit from annual rabies vaccination, and most one-year rabies products are similar or identical to the three-year products with regard to duration of immunity and effectiveness. However, if they are one-year rabies vaccines, they must be legally given annually!



#### Be wise and immunize, but immunize wisely!

### POMERANIANS AT THE FIRST DOCNA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

October 5, 6, and 7, 2007, Dogs on Course in North America (DOCNA) held its first ever national championship agility trial. DOCNA was founded in 2005 by Jim and Mary Kay Mills with the goal of providing "agility for everyone." The championship trial was held simultaneously in the east (Hamden, Connecticut) and in the west (Buckeye, Arizona). Many events were competed on a regional basis, but for one event, the North America Challenge, all dogs competed nationally. The Eastern and Western Championships drew exhibitors and dogs from Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Nevada, and Utah.

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Three Pomeranians competed successfully in the championships. Among them, the three Poms brought home 19 first and 5 second place ribbons, as well as three gold and three silver medals.

Streak (Hylan Acres PT-Cruiser NAP NJP), a 7" tall, 4 pound black and white parti girl owned by Judy Chandler (Sacramento, CA), competed in the Western Championships and came home with eight first place ribbons, one second place ribbon, one gold medal and one silver medal. Besides a regional first place and a national second place in the North America Challenge (NAC), Streak advanced to the Finals in both Jumpers and Standard, earning a blue ribbon in each one. The North America Challenge is a Standard agility course that offers more difficult challenges than a regular Standard course, with several discriminations and changes of direction required. Kody (Kodiak MX MXJ), a red sable owned and handled by Sheryl Petruska (Orefield, PA), earned 8 ribbons, including seven first place ribbons, as well as a gold and a silver medal. Kody won first place regionally in the NAC and second place nationally, as well as qualifying to compete in the Final rounds, where he won first place in both of his Final events. Kody is nearly 11 years old but still runs agility courses and does it in style! Kody has now earned 51 titles during his agility career.

Ziggy (Zero Gravity Zigmyester) and his owner/handler, Cheryl Truskowski, ran at the Specialist level (DOCNA's highest level), earning eight ribbons, including three first place awards. Besides successfully competing in Traditional Gamblers and Strategic Time Gamblers, Ziggy progressed to the Final Standard round, where he placed second. He also earned a regional first place and national second place award in the North America Challenge, as well as both gold and silver medals. 



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

### 7th AKC/Eukanuba National Championship

Over 2,444 dogs competed for \$225,000 at the Seventh Annual AKC/Eukanuba National Championship December 1 and 2, 2007 in Long Beach, California. The show was held in conjunction with the AKC Agility Invitational and the AKC National Obedience Invitational for a combined entry of nearly 3,000 dogs.

New this year was the Eukanuba World Challenge. This international competition featured top dogs from 40 countries and six continents.

The AKC/Eukanuba National Championship will be simulcast on Animal Planet and the Discovery Channel Saturday, February 2, 2008. Highlights from the AKC Agility Invitational will air on Animal Planet on Sunday, February 10, 2008.

Invited to compete in the show were: the country's top 25 dogs from each breed and variety, Best in Show winners, reigning National Specialty winners, and breeder/owner handled Champions from the Bred-by-Exhibitor and/or Puppy class, as well as international competitors. Over 981 dogs, nearly 43 percent of the total, were entered in the Bred-by Exhibitor competition.








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### What is your vaccination protocol? Do you follow your vet's advice when to vaccinate?

I try to follow any directions that my vet gives me, but if it doesn't seem right, I question so he/she will explain the reasoning behind it to me. I then get an education along the way, or sometimes the vet does. I like a vet that will work with me and also go into detail and explain what and why. I don't blindly follow advice. Because I have a setup that quarantines my Pom babies, I give their first shot at 9 weeks, second at 12 and third at 16 weeks. When I used to raise German Shepherds and Rotties (especially the Rotties because they are more susceptible to Parvo) my vaccination schedule was: 5 weeks - killed Parvo, 6 wks - 1st Ft. Dodge Puppy Shot, 9 wks - 2nd Puppy Shot, 12 wks - 3rd Puppy Shot, 16 wks - 4th Puppy Shot.

### **Molly Anderson - Pawfection Pomeranians**

I give a shot at 8 weeks, one at 12 weeks, and one at 16 weeks. If the dog is going to be shown, I give one at 6 months also. Then, one year from the end of the series. I usually don't give them another shot. I give Proguard 5 only. I don't give Lepto or Corona though. I have spoken to vets in my area, and they haven't had cases of either. My personal vet gives more shots than I do, and she says what I do is fine.

### Kay - Kara Poms

I follow the new vaccination protocol (puppy series then one year later) although we must follow the city law for rabies vaccinations whether the dog needs it or not. (See Dr. Bob's article at Critteradvocacy.org.) I would never take puppies into a vet clinic for vaccinations as they are not immune and the chance of getting a disease from there is too great.

### **Virginia Dimmick - Pufpride Pomeranians**

Since I very rarely offer my puppies for sale, I wait as long as possible to begin vaccinating. If I feel comfortable, I may give the first shot as late as 11 or 12 weeks. I give the second and last puppy shot 4 weeks later. I was using Vanguard 5, but now only give parvo and distemper. They also get that at 1 year old. I'm still experimenting. I try not to give rabies before 6 months. However, that is not always possible since I have a kennel license that requires annual inspections. If a pup is going to a new home, I start the shots at 9 weeks. Because my Poms are very small and I am an overly anxious mom, they don't generally leave before 12 weeks. I am curious to know how many breeders are giving only half the vaccine at a time and how that is working. Valerie Allridge - Allridge Poms

I use Intervet puppy starting at 8-9 weeks every 3-4 weeks for 3 vaccinations. I give one more at 1 year of age, and that is it. I do give rabies, as they are pretty strict about that here in Texas. And no, I don't follow my vet's advice on when to vaccinate. Linda Pelz—DreamWeaver Poms

I absolutely DO NOT follow my vet's advice on when to vaccinate and what to vaccinate for. I did not vaccinate my children annually, and, likewise, I view canine vaccinations as providing effective life-time immunity upon completion of the series. You can read my article in this issue about the AKC Health Canine conference and see the position of the top research scientists on the MINIMUM duration of immunity for canine vaccines. I vaccinate with Proguard 5 at 8 weeks, 12 weeks and 16 weeks. I give only ONE booster of this same vaccine exactly 1 year after the last one was given. I do not vaccinate again for these things. I will have my vet give a 3 year rabies at 6 months, and I do not repeat that either. I have brought my vet all the articles about over-vaccination, as well as Dr. Jean Dodd's protocols. My vet respects my position on this issue, but I do not think it has changed their minds for their other clients.

### Kathy Norem - EagleCreek Poms

I wait as long as I can before giving the first shot, usually no later than 10 weeks. Then 4-5 weeks later the second round and again in 4-5 weeks for the last one. They each get a booster at 2 years then not again unless necessary. Rabies is given at 6 months or older and another one a year later then no more unless I absolutely must. I use Duramune Puppy Shot, but this round I used Proguard 5. Rabies must be done by my vet. I have in the past given half a shot to 8-week-olds who were just 13 oz. with no ill effects, but try not to do that if at all possible.

### E. Katie Gammill - Lerna, Illinois

Every breed standard has a suggested size. Many go to such extremes as to qualify sizes as "Disqualifications". Often exhibitors pushing the limit become agitated when a judge has the "audacity" to measure and disqualify their dog. Ever notice a dog acceptable on size when it loses to the competition, grows "taller" in proportion to the wins he/she is awarded?

Exhibitors can reinstate dogs disqualified regarding size and temperament if they elect to go through the process of reinstatement. This is a true statement: IF one chooses to show something different from the "norm", one should realize a judge might well "take exception" and react accordingly. However, this article is not about breed size, disqualifications, faults or virtues of any breed. This article measures "character" regarding participants in the sport. In this case, "size matters."

When my grandson was still small enough to ride in a grocery cart, we wheeled through the local supermarket where they were giving away samples of pizza. Going down an aisle, this lady asked him, "Would you like a piece of pizza?" He replied. "Yes, thank you." She smiled at him, and we promptly went on our way.

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# **AKC CODE OF SPORTSMANSHIP**

The sport of purebred dog competitive events dates prior to 1884, the year of AKC's birth. Shared values of those involved in the sport include principles of sportsmanship. They are practiced in all sectors of our sport:

### CONFORMATION, PERFORMANCE AND COMPANION.

Many believe that these principles of sportsmanship are the prime reason why our sport has thrived for over one hundred years. With the belief that it is useful to periodically articulate the fundamentals of our sport, this code is presented.

- Sportsmen respect the history, traditions and integrity of the sport of purebred dogs.
- Sportsmen commit themselves to values of fair play, honesty, courtesy, and vigorous competition, as well as winning and losing with grace.
- Sportsmen refuse to compromise their commitment and obligation to the sport of purebred dogs by injecting personal advantage or consideration into their decisions or behavior.
- The sportsman judge judges only on the merits of the dogs and considers no other factors.
- The sportsman judge or exhibitor accepts constructive criticism.
- The sportsman exhibitor declines to enter or exhibit under a judge where it might reasonably appear that the judge's placements could be based on something other than the merits of the dogs.
- The sportsman exhibitor refuses to compromise the impartiality of a judge.
- The sportsman respects the AKC bylaws, rules, regulations and policies governing the sport of purebred dogs.
- Sportsmen find that vigorous competition and civility are not inconsistent and are able to appreciate the merit of their competition and the effort of competitors.
- Sportsmen welcome, encourage and support newcomers to the sport.
- Sportsmen will deal fairly with all those who trade with them.
- Sportsmen are willing to share honest and open appraisals of both the strengths and weaknesses of their breeding stock.
- Sportsmen spurn any opportunity to take personal advantage of positions offered or bestowed upon them.
- Sportsmen always consider as paramount the welfare of their dog.
- Sportsmen refuse to embarrass the sport, the American Kennel Club, or themselves while taking part in the sport.

First I will start with an intro. My name is Danielle Sartain of Dasar Pomeranians in Michigan. I am a Licensed Veterinary Technician and work for Dr. Wilson, one of the top reproduction vets in the country. In addition to reproduction he also specializes in orthopedics and maintains four veterinary hospitals in the eastern part of Michigan. Wilson Veterinary Hospital is a 24-hour hospital and is also an AKC certified Frozen Semen Center. Within the last two years we started traveling to different shows and collecting and freezing on the show grounds as a convenience to our clients. At the shows we also put on a variety of reproduction seminars to help educate the public.

I have been involved in Pomeranians for about four years. My first litter is just turning 2 years old. I decided I would like to contribute to the Pomeranian Review because it is a very informative publication that is well-written and is always in good taste.

Now that you decided that you want to start breeding and you have done all your research, you are ready to begin. Well maybe not so quickly. Just because you have a bitch and she comes into season, is that a reason to breed? Knowledge is everything, and you can never read enough before you think about having your first litter. It is also a good idea to attend dog shows, watch the breed, get to know breeders, and ask questions. Finding a good mentor is priceless, someone who wants to help you produce the next generation of the breed. It may not be bad to find a good friend in another breed.

Once you think you have the correct bitch, it's time to find a male that will complement her, both in type and pedigree. Instead of breeding to the hottest winning dog in the rings, try to breed to a dog that produces consistently, a stud that produces close to the standard. To breed to the stud of your choice, you may have to ship your bitch or have semen shipped to your bitch. Either way, it probably won't be easy, but nothing about breeding is easy! Breeding for convenience will probably not get you the quality you are after. And, by the way, it most likely will not be cheap either.

Choosing to breed is a personal decision. It takes a lot of education and a lot of work. It is challenging and can be rewarding!

In 1980 Elisabeth Spillman, of Vasteras, Sweden, bought a Pom bitch from me. I showed POMIRISH SPORT'S SWEDISH LADY to her AKC Champion title and was going to send her to Elisabeth. Elisabeth said I should keep her and breed her to one of my Poms and THEN send her.

I bred "CH. Lady" to my top winning light cream CH. POMIRISH CREAM PUFF'S ONLY CHANCE" aptly named because his dam CH POMIRISH CREAM PUFF died during her c-section surgery. The two pups were raised by a bitch with her own litter. That was Cream Puff's "only chance" to produce a litter. Both Chance and his sister finished their AKC Champion title.

Sweden had quite a long quarantine at the time "Lady" was sent to Sweden. Lady whelped a litter of four puppies in quarantine. As I understand, she and her litter were to come out of quarantine soon when the Veterinarian in charge put a new arrival, a Spaniel if I remember correctly, from the USA in the same room as she and her pups. That dog died of Parvo. The pups got Parvo from that new import. Three pups died. One male survived. Elisabeth named the surviving pup, "Noble Art Chicago Bullit". She said no one would know the location of Mishicot, WI, (population of 900) but everyone would know where Chicago was.

When "Bullit" was of showing age, Elisabeth sent his picture to me. He was the most gorgeous Pom pup I had ever seen, so nice that I told my husband that we just HAD to go and see him. We went to Sweden to see this terrific little pup, in person. In time, "Bullit" became the top Pom in Sweden and later Top Pom in Finland. He became a Nordic Champion.

Today, "Bullit" is behind most of the Poms in that country and behind many Poms in the other Nordic countries. I often think of the potential lost when his 90-January/February 2008 APC Pomeranian Review littermates died because of the stupidity of that Veterinarian in charge of quarantine. Elisabeth said he was fired soon after that. Many more quarantine reforms took place. Today is much better than it was in 1980.

I received an e-mail from Elisabeth last year inviting me to come to judge the Swedish Pomeranian Club's National Specialty. The Swedish Kennel Club also invited me to judge their show the following day.

I flew to Sweden on Wednesday July 18 from Green Bay, Wisconsin and arrived in Stockholm, Sweden on Thursday July 19 at 2:10 PM. The Pom Specialty was held on an island on the grounds of an old castle on July 21. My accommodations were at a downtown hotel every day except the Saturday before the All-Breed show. (For easy shopping).

### THE SVENSA POMERANIAN KLUBBEN OFFICIELLA UTSTALLNING

The weather was gorgeous. The Poms were beautiful. The ring Stewards mark the catalog after I judge each class and make my placements. Keep in mind I am trying to decipher my Swedish marked

catalog. Things are very different than we in the USA are used to as far as awards go.

### **PUPPY CLASSES (Valpklass)**

There was one very nice red 4-6 month puppy dog entered who was awarded BOS Puppy Dog in the 4-6 month Puppy Dog class. KEROVS DEVIL HEART was 10 days shy of 6 months old.

In the 6-9 month puppy dog class, four puppies were entered. One was absent. I chose the 8 month old creamsable POM-CLASSIC KING OF SHADOW from Norway, for my 6-9 month Puppy Dog class Best of Breed Puppy Dog AND the BEST IN SHOW PUPPY. This puppy had it all. Those of you who know me surely know I love a Pom with small high-set ears, high set tail carried flat over the back, one who moves with a head carried proudly and high, with an attitude that says, "Get out of the way. Here I come!" This puppy had it all! The owners were from Norway.

There were five 4-6 month Puppy Bitches entered in this class. The Best of Breed Puppy Bitch in the 4-6 month class went to CIMAROSAS BLACK MAGIC WOMAN, who was also awarded BEST


Our gift exchange turned out to be quite lively with several items being rather popular. Darlyene Spann's gift was an elegant pink dog bed, just
